"I passed through Naromoru Boys, my old school that I left 31 years ago," said Simon Kuria, our Sunshine Centre social worker. "I was a student there for 4 years from 1989 to1992, then I worked there as a librarian cum history/religious teacher from 1994 to1996. It was very nostalgic."

Simon was visiting the school to visit former street boy Cyrus Maina who is in his final year at school. "I encouraged him to work very hard as he is only 2 months away from his final KCSE exams. He was very happy to learn that we

shared same school as students, and the staff and students we met were excited too. I believe I was his pacesetter!"

Victor's hard work rewarded with university place



"You have been placed to BACHELOR OF EDUCATION (SCIENCE WITH IT) at J.O.O.U.S.T"

This was the text message that Victor had been hoping for, confirming he had been awarded a place at university.

Victor is an orphan who was cared for by his grandmother who was too poor to look after him, so he went to the streets where he was rescued and brought to our Sunshine Centre and enrolled back into school.

Social worker Simon Kuria commented, "We are happy to inform you that the hard work of Victor Ochieng has finally paid off. He has been admitted at Jaramogi Oginga Odinga University It was his first choice and he is assured of Government employment as a high school science/IT teacher."

Tumaini: a home to dream from

We have been providing a home for orphaned and abandoned children at Tumaini in Mombasa for nearly 20 years. The children we supported then are now grown up, but a new generation has taken their place.

Ali (usually know by his nickname Johnton) is in Form 1 at high school, and dreams of going to university to study architecture.


Kelvin destined for higher things
